Royal Palms & White Point State Beaches

Fort MacArthur Museum



The museum is dedicated to the preservation and interpretation of the history of Fort MacArthur, a U.S. Army post which guarded the Los Angeles

harbor from 1914 to 1974. The Museum was established in 1985, and it is housed in the corridors and galleries of historic Battery Osgood-Farley. The Fort MacArthur Reservations hold an important collection of historical structures which were part of the U.S. Army's role in the defense of the American continental coastline from invasion. These structures clearly trace the development of American coastal defenses, from the all big gun era of the turn of the century to the missile era of today. is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Cabrillo Marine Aquarium

GRAY WHALE FACTS

The annual gray whale migration is undeniably one of Earth's greatest wildlife spectacles, and the California coast is an

outstanding place to see migrating gray whales. Gray whales are charismatic marine mammals that can reach 40-50 feet in length and weigh more than 36 tons (72,000 pounds) when fully grown.



GRAY WHALE CENSUS & BEHAVIOR PROJECT

This is a unique long-term shorebased study of the marine utilize the nearshore waters of

mammals that

the Palos Verdes Peninsula, located approximately 8 miles north of the Los Angeles Harbor. This full season shore-based grav whale census has operated on the Palos Verdes Peninsula since 1984. Trained volunteers spot and track Pacific gray whales on their annual migration, recording counts and behaviors. They also identify and record other marine mammals seen. This project runs during daylight hours. from December 1st through late May.



PALOS VERDES KELP **RESTORATION PROJECT**

The kelp forest ecosystems off the Southern California coast are known to be some of the most

diverse and productive ecosystems in the world. New and longstanding threats posed by imbalances in the predator-prey ecosystem threatens the very survival of the kelp forests. The Bay Foundation's Kelp Restoration project on the Palos Verdes Peninsula is addressing this threat.



THE PALOS VERDES NATURE PRESERVE

is approximately 1,400 acres with 11 individual Reserves. The Portuguese Bend Reserve is the

largest: 424 acres. The City of Rancho Palos Verdes owns the Nature Preserve and co-manages it with the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land **Conservancy** for ecological value and habitat restoration. This Nature Preserve is home to coastal sage scrub habitat: a community of intensely fragrant and highly drought resistant shrubs and flowering plants. Many different animals live throughout this rare habitat, including the threatened California gnatcatcher and coastal cactus wren. The individual reserves provide passive recreational opportunities, including hiking trails, equestrian trails and bicycle trails. Please observe all posted regulations.

Native plants are the foundation of the Peninsula's ecosystem on which native wildlife thrives.




REFLECTIONS ON THE FUTURE OF TIDE POOLS

many species of marine organisms and connect or reconnect people with nature. Visitors immerse themselves in the environment as they watch the power of the waves, feel the spray, and hear the gentle tumbling of small rocks. Tidepools provide the first and often only experience for many urban residents to discover firsthand the diversity, resilience, fragility, and power of the ocean.

level is low and the surf is typically calmer. In Southern California, there are two high and two low tides each day. Low tides occur approximately every 12 hours 25 minutes.




SHARED FUN FOR THE WHOLE FAMILY
